Senior Health MattersFall Prevention Strategies

Combinations of the following strategies have the potential to decrease fall risk and the number of falls:



- 1. Physical activity using more than one exercise component of balance and muscle strength training. The most effective is Tai Chi which is reported to reduce the number of falls by 37% 50%
- 2. Reduction of psychotropic medications has been shown to reduce the rate of falls by 66% in community dwelling adults.
- 3. Pacemaker insertion and cataract surgery in appropriate patients has been shown to reduce the rate of falls by 58% and 34% respectively.
- 4. Modifying home hazards by removing fall provoking items such as loose rugs and clutter, and installing safety equipment such as grab-bars and stair-railings, etc. has been shown to reduce the rate of fall by 41% and the number of falls by 21%. This benefit was most obvious when carried out by occupational therapists.
- 5. Anti-slip shoe devices have been shown to reduce the rate of fall in ambulatory individuals who walk outside in icy conditions by 58%.



On Wednesday, September 3 at 10:30AM, we will discuss "Waiting for Godot"



account of one of the world's great political texts. Incisive, entertaining, and occasionally controversial, this "biography" of America's framing document explains not only what the Constitution says but also why the Constitution says it. We all know this much: the Constitution is neither immutable nor perfect.
