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Final Tally on 1993 Community House Fund Drive

Once again, Senior Men's Club members and applicants have played a strong supportive role in taking the Fund Drive over the top.

Here are the numbers:

- 355 members gave \$26,869, an average of \$75.
- 223 applicants gave \$12,310, an average of \$55.
- Total giving of \$39,179 was just over 17% of the overall Fund Drive total of \$227,491.


Spoonerism, Freudian Slip or Hard Fact?
