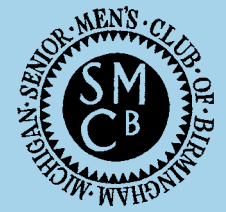

John Steele's Presidency Teamwork, Quality and Volunteerism

When John Steele became the Club's 59th president in January, 2014, he stated that his highest priority would be membership - specifically initiatives to recruit new members and retain current members. Now a year later, John is part of a team that is producing impressive results. The Club's membership decline has been reversed, and membership count stabilized.

"These results came from excellent teamwork," said John. "The President is like a coach, and the officers and committee members are the team players. Together, they perform in harmony with positive results." Several interest groups have been added this year. They include the genealogy group, a chorus, and walking and spinning groups. Another new activity was having introductory meetings with members of The Grosse Pointe Senior Men's Club.



Advanced technology is another area in which John Steele has played a leadership role. Again, working as a team, the Improvement Committee and Publicity Committee have created a new web page that is attractive and easy to use. A future application could include additional articles and photographs for *The Reminder*. A PowerPoint slide show was developed this year. It runs before each Friday meeting and during lunch, helping members stay informed of upcoming events and new members.

Senior Health Matters Tips for Conversations with Someone with Hearing Loss

- Face the person when speaking to them
- Keep areas well lit
- Get their attention before you begin talking
- In social situations, try to seat them in an area with less background noise
- Speak a little more loudly, but don't shout
- Speak at your usual pace. There's no need to s-l-o-w your speech pattern and put everyone to sleep.
- No exaggerated mouth movements. Most hard-of-hearing persons have learned "normal" lip reading

Hearing loss due to the aging process can begin in the early 60s. Between 25 and 40% of the population over age 65 and 80% of those over age 80 have hearing loss. The social and emotional consequences are considerable and can result in impairment of cognitive function and understanding of health care information.

Book Reading Groups

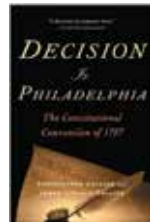
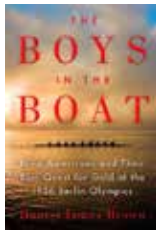
On Wednesday, January 7 at 3:00PM we will discuss "Decision in Philadelphia"

by Christopher Collier and James Lincoln Collier. The authors set the scene of the Great Constitutional Convention and offer biographical sketches of the major participants—Washington, Hamilton, Madison, The Pinckney's, Elbridge Gerry, and others. Many compromises were necessary to write a constitution that would be acceptable to the 55 members and the voters of the thirteen colonies.

These men were willing to split their differences. They were not ideologues who would concede nothing. If these men had not made mutual concessions there would be no Constitution and no United States as we know it today.

On Monday, January 19 at 10:30AM the group will discuss "The Boys in the Boat" by Daniel James Brown. The book chronicles the long, passionate journey of the University of Washington's rowing team to the 1936 Berlin Olympics. The journey of one rower, Joe Rantz, forms the emotional center on the narrative. Rantz was a tall, strapping country boy who had largely been fending for himself after being abandoned by his family. In 1933 he gets a shot as a freshman on the UW rowing team. Brown explores an extraordinary moment in sports history that is almost forgotten. The underdog members of this eight man crew beat out their east coast rivals to represent the USA in the Olympics.

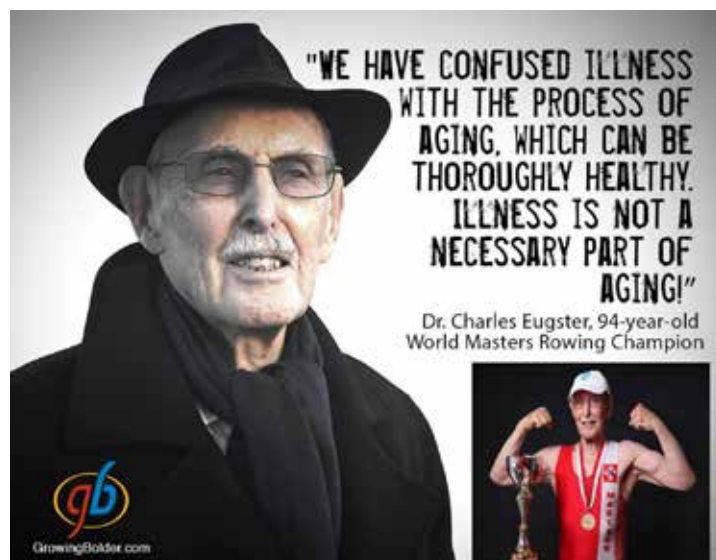
Speakers Needed
