## **Book Reading Groups**

On Wednesday, January 6 at 10:30AM we will be discussing "The Mao Case by

Qui Xiaolong." This book is dedicated to the people that suffered under Mao, and this novel has more heft than the average procedural, and political complexity in lieu of action. Chief Inspector Chen Cao of the Shanghai Police Department has misgivings about Party paranoia, and the extreme circumlocutions needed to raise any issue concerning Mao convey the fragility of China's more recent liberalizations. Inspector Chen has a glass-half-empty ambivalence towards his political masters. The Mao Case offers a meditation on power, myth and the policing of history.

On Monday, January 18 at 3:00PM we will be discussing "Deaf Sentence by David Lodge." This is a lovely and beautifully written novel about a hard-ofhearing linguist trying to navigate through the noises and silences of his life. These noises and silences are at times confounding and illuminating, disturbing and comforting, and tragic and comic. Lodge takes his time telling this story and some people may not like the pace of the book, which can meander somewhat aimlessly at times. The beauty, nuance, and insight in this story lay in these perambulations, though. All in all, a lovely and fulfilling read told with humor, sensitivity, and insight.


### President's Award


