## EXECUTIVE BOARD ACTIONS

Two Executive Board actions were taken at the meeting held December 13. First, the board supported a presidential proposal that the first meeting in February 2006 be held on Thursday February 2, rather than the normal Friday, February 3. This action was taken to accommodate a Community House request, to enable them to schedule a special event associated with the Super Bowl. The *REMINDER* will show this schedule change. The Discussion Group and bridge will also be held on February 2.

Secondly, the board authorized the president to advise The Community House that the Club would agree to an increase in the Friday lunch price to \$9.00, rather than the \$8.50 previously proposed. This increase will be effective in May 2006 and is intended to avoid change-making problems for the lunch committee. This higher price will remain in effect at least for three years.

## The Purple Rose Theatre An SMC Mid-Winter Blossom

A mid-winter outing to the Purple Rose Theatre in Chelsea on Wednesday, February 1 will feature a late lunch in a private dining room and a matinee performance of Jeff Daniels' new play, *Guest Artist*.

Your \$53 payment will cover transportation, lunch and theatre tickets that include a group discount.

Door-to-door bus service starts with departure at 11:30 a.m. from the First Presbyterian Church rear parking lot. Arrival by 1:00 p.m. in front of the Chelsea Grill (not the Common Grill) allows time for a leisurely lunch featuring a choice of chicken or fish entrees.

Following lunch, which includes dessert, we will reboard the bus for a very short ride to the Purple Rose Theatre in downtown Chelsea, arriving by 2:30 p.m. Curtain is at 3:00 p.m.

The Senior Men's Club has reservations for 56 of the theatre's 168 seats.

The play is described as Daniels' most autobiographical work yet. Promotion information proclaims that he "weaves a funny and poignant story about a young man facing his hero and explores the relationship between the dreams of youth and the wisdom of age."





Jack McCuen, the January chairman for our after-lunch Discussion Group meeting every Friday, wants everyone to see clearly. He has arranged some interesting and informative programs that should be of interest to many members of the Senior Men's Club. You are invited and encouraged to attend whether you want to join in the discussion or just listen and learn. The schedule of topics and presenters is on the front cover of *The Reminder* each month.


For the first meeting, SMC member Walt Reinke is bringing in a speaker to tell us about the Michigan Eye-Bank which makes a major contribution to the restoration of vision. In addition to being a provider of recovered eye tissue, the Eye-Bank supports scientists in eye and vision related research and works collaboratively with Lions Clubs and organ procurement agencies to promote the importance of eye, organ and tissue donations.

The following week we will have a presentation by a retired professor from Wayne State University on understanding the chaos of today's politics. He will provide functional definitions for the four traditional political positions (reactionary, conservative, liberal and radical) and describe the language choices that people who adhere to a given ideology make because of the glasses through which they see the world.

For the third meeting, Col. McCuen will explain how, much to our detriment, we keep remembering the wrong lessons about the Vietnam War. He'll describe what the lessons are not, what the real lessons are, and how we need to use the right lessons in the present war. The last meeting in January will feature an army officer who has just returned from Iraq. He will talk about his experiences as a Civil Affairs Officer on a direct support A-Team. His CA team drove over 8,400 miles while they were deployed, and they managed and assisted projects worth over \$4.4 million.

To broaden your knowledge, spend an hour of your time after lunch on Friday at a Discussion Group meeting. All members, applicants, and guests are welcome to attend. You'll hear about things that may help you to see things more clearly and/or have something to talk about with friends.



# Auld Lang Syne

The two candidates for our prestigious Golden Oldies this month share a background in General Motors. They held major leadership roles during the golden years of that corporation and they have brought their skills to the Senior Men's Club.

**Don Doty** was born in southwest Detroit on a street named Navy. His heritage can be traced to Edward Doty who came to the United States on the Mayflower.




He graduated from Cass Technical High School in 1939 and received his B.S. degree in Mechanical Engineering from Michigan State in 1943. Prior to graduation the draft board allowed him to choose the branch of service he would serve. He chose the Navy and was commissioned as an Ensign. He started working for Fisher Body and 2 months later he was called to report for duty at Fort Schuyler, N.Y.

The slogan "Join the Navy and see the world" comes to mind when you talk of Don's experience in the Navy. Following a chemical warfare course at Fort Schuyler, he was sent to Hingham, MA for training in ammunition handling and then to the American University in Washington, DC to a bomb and fuse school. His travels then took him to Crane, IN followed by Norfolk, VA where he boarded an LST, but the cargo caught on fire. As a result, his ship missed the convoy and he crossed the Atlantic escorted by only a converted Coast Guard cutter, landing at Oran, Africa. His next orders sent him to Hawthorne, Nevada where his duties included riding ammunition trains destined for cities in the United States. His next transfer was to Oahu, Hawaii and West Loch where he supervised the dumping of ammunition into the Pacific. He was discharged from the Navy at Great Lakes, IL in 1946. Returning to civilian life, Don returned to the Fisher Body division of General Motors as a process engineer. Upon his retirement in 1982 he was Engineer-in-Charge with multiple duties.

Sixty one years ago, Don married his childhood sweetheart, Ruth Merrill (also a native Detroiter). They have lived in Royal Oak and now reside in Birmingham. They have three children and two granddaughters. For college colors they did not choose the GREEN and WHITE but selected the BLUE and GOLD, and all graduated from the University of Michigan. Don has served as President

of the Fisher Body Retirees Club as well as the Fisher Body Production Engineering Club. As a member of the Senior Men's Club he has served many years on the Luncheon Committee. He has participated in bowling, golf and bridge. The Golden Oldies are pleased to count Don among their members.

**Ken Brooker** was born in Pittsfield, Massachusetts, grew up in Lebanon, New York, worked his way through Iowa State University and obtained a B.S. degree in Mechanical Engineering. He accepted a position with General Motors which brought him to



Michigan. During World War II he served in the Air Force Air Material Command at Wright Field in Dayton, Ohio. Upon his return to General Motors, he was the Administrative Head of the GM Engineering Staff for many years and secretary of two key GM committees that were established by Alfred Sloan after WWII. He has been active in the Society of Engineers and conceived the idea for the noted Ed Cole Award for Creativity.

Locally, Ken was founder of the Boy Scout Troop at Harlan School and an executive officer in Explorer Post 1992. He was awarded the Silver Buckthorn Award for his work in planning the bicentennial Scouterama at the Silverdome. After his retirement in 1981, he immediately became involved in the founding of the Alzheimer Association in Detroit and one on Cape Cod where he and his wife, Pat, kept a summer home for 20 years. Presently Ken is serving as the new co-chairman of the Audio Committee for the SMC. He has been active in the golf and bowling leagues and has presented several talks at Discussion Group Meetings. The Brookers lived in Hickory Heights for many years and now reside at the Heathers. Their three sons are graduates of Seaholm. They continued their post graduate work at Michigan State, Eastern Michigan, Syracuse and the Cranbrook Graduate Art School. His family includes six grandchildren and four great grandchildren. We are proud to welcome Ken into the Golden Oldies.
