"He must, however, reside in one of the following communities included in the postal zip code areas shown on the Oakland County Planning Division Zip Code Map dated June/July 1977; Birmingham (48008-9-10-11), Bloomfield Hills (48013), Bloomfield Township (48010 and 48013), Franklin (48025), Bingham Farms (48010) Beverley Hills (48009-10) or that portion of Troy (48084) west of Coolidge to Adams Road and north of Derby to South Boulevard, formerly served by the Birmingham Post Office."
