## The Reminder — 50th Anniversary Edition

The Senior Men's Club launched activities and membership solicitation more than 60 years ago. As the Club expanded over time, keeping members informed as to activities became increasingly challenging, leading to the decision to launch a Club newsletter. In the fall of 1968, the first edition was published, perhaps appropriately called *The Reminder*.

The initial monthly issues were simple mimeographed pages which listed planned speakers and subjects for the current month plus other significant activities. Distribution was via handout at Friday meetings. As the Club expanded in terms of events and activities, *The Reminder* gradually became a larger publication with a more professional appearance, moving from 4 to 6 to 8 pages, and sometimes more over time. Content has been considerably broadened, with monthly issues detailing Club activities and events, plus articles about individual members, reports on changes in Club policies plus selected photos of new members, notable speakers and Club personalities.

Mail distribution was launched in 1997 followed by email availability in 2005. In early days, we mailed over 600 copies monthly. As more and more members used email, postal delivery counts declined – now about 150. The email version offers two significant advantages – early arrival plus dynamic color printing, which adds considerable appeal to *The Reminder*. In addition, email delivery achieves cost reductions. Past editions of *The Reminder* are fully available on the Club website.

Research conducted with members has contributed importantly to *The Reminder*. The great majority (77%) of *Reminder* readers indicated they “read almost all articles.” A number of suggestions as to content and flow were implemented. We even learned that about half of our member wives read *The Reminder*.

*The Reminder* has benefitted from solid and professional editorial leadership over time, including Frank Angelo, former *Detroit Free Press* Editor; Alvie Smith, author and GM Top Management Speechwriter; and Chuck Kirkpatrick, innovative leader and later Club President. The undersigned served as editor for ten years. Lee Trumbull of The Community House staff has contributed importantly for many years, ensuring that *The Reminder* is professionally developed and complete and accurate as to content.

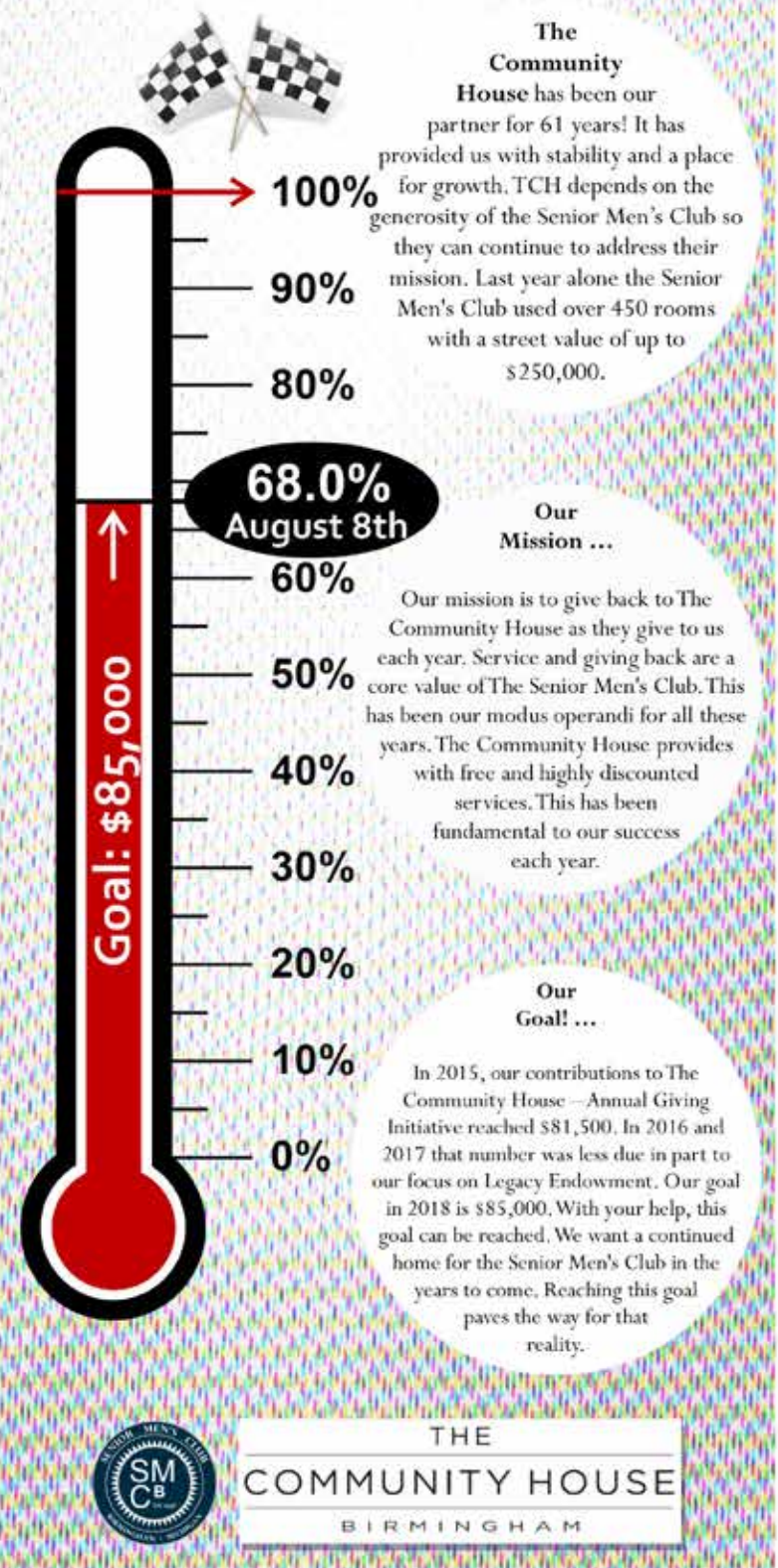
## SMC Dues – 2019

## Senior Health Matters Immunization of Older Adults Against Seasonal Influenza

Classical influenza symptoms include the sudden onset of fever, body aches, and fatigue; commonly there may also be a headache, muscle ache, dry cough, sore throat and nasal congestion. Older adults frequently present with loss of appetite, mental status changes, and unexplained fever, or with worsening of underlying lung or cardiovascular disease. The flu season is during the fall and winter, typically between October and April. People aged 65 years and over account for an estimated 71% to 85% of all seasonal influenza-related deaths and 54% to 70% of related hospitalizations.

There are three types of influenza viruses, classified as A, B and C. Only A and B cause clinically significant disease. There are five subtypes of influenza A. Influenza A (H3N2) has predominated in the last eight years and has been associated with increased hospitalizations and deaths especially among adults aged 65 years and over. Influenza B viruses can be divided into 2 main lineages, B/Yamagata and B/Victoria.

Vaccination is by far the best way of preventing influenza. The CDC estimates that for the 2015-2016 influenza season alone, vaccination prevented 5.1 million cases of influenza-related illnesses, 2.5 million medical visits, 71,000 hospitalizations and 3000 deaths from pneumonia and influenza. Annual vaccination is required because of changes in circulating strains together with waning immunity over time. There are several different types of influenza vaccine available in the U.S. containing either 3 or 4, World Health Organization-selected, inactivated viruses. There is a recombinant vaccine for those with an allergy to eggs. For those 65 years and older, there is a high dose, inactivated, split-virus influenza vaccine which has been available in the U.S. since 2009. It has shown a 24% reduction in the risk of laboratory-confirmed influenza compared with the standard dose containing three inactivated influenza viruses. A reduction in the risk of influenza-related hospital admissions and death, even in high-risk populations such as older adults living in long-term residential care homes has been observed.

Ask your doctor about getting the high-dose influenza vaccine for the 2018-2019 flu season.
