'Cherish Community House' -- A 1923 Editor Tells Why

Recently your editor had occasion to speak to the Senior Women's Club of The Community House about the history of the House.

During that talk, he quoted from an editorial that is something of a classic with its flowery language and focus on basic principles. It appeared in *The Eccentric* in 1923, shortly after the House was opened.

It also illustrates the depth of involvement of the paper in working with the community. George Averill had purchased *The Eccentric* a few years earlier, and it is more than likely that it was he who wrote the editorial. He and his brother Paul were much involved in helping to make the House a success.

Under the simple headline, "The Community House," the *Eccentric* editor wrote:

"Life compels us to work for a livelihood. To procure food, raiment and shelter, one must engage in some pursuit that renders service to his fellows. A good majority of us work in a rather prosaic world. We ought to take time to spend some part of our waking hours in some pleasant recreational pursuit.

"People were not made to live alone. The nature of man demands social intercourse. We must meet others on a common footing. We must forever seek friendships to brighten the path that leads to the grave.

"A place where Birmingham folks may meet in friendly fashion has been created here. It is known as a Community House. Although it stands on property owned by St. James parish, its builders have publicly stated that sectarian religion has no place in the curriculum. It exists for all of us to visit and meet others to dance, to laugh, to sing, and at times, to hear someone discuss things that interest and educate.

"We should cherish this Community House. We should do everything in our power to make it a great success ...So, folks, resolve to spend some of your life in intellectual and recreational education ...

"If you don't do it while the time is present, you'll find no time later when your earthly remains are huddled in a coffin."

Now that, your editor submits, is some kind of eloquent plea for support of The Community House.
