Lung Cancer Screening

In the US, over 200,000 people are diagnosed with lung cancer each year and about 160,000 will die. In July, the US Preventative Services Task Force proposed that adults age 55 to 79 who are at high risk for lung cancer, be screened with low-dose CT scans. Smoking is the biggest risk factor resulting in about 85% of US lung cancers.



High risk is defined as smoking one pack a day for 30 years, 2 packs a day for 15 years and so on. Healthy people in that age range with at least a 30 pack year history of smoking who are either still smoking or have quit in the last 15 years are all candidates to consider screening. Your risk goes up the more you smoke, the longer you smoke and with age.

With screening before age 55, the balance of benefits and harms shifts. The high rate of false-positive results associated with lung cancer screening can lead to additional imaging which, in turn, results in more radiation, anxiety and, in some cases, lung surgery to prove there is no cancer. Screening after age 79, on average, confers no survival benefit.




Next month on Wednesday, October 2 we will discuss "Outliers" by Malcolm Gladwell.


Members are also encouraged to attend the Discussion Group meeting on Friday, September 13. SMC member, Al Huberty will discuss the use of computers with digital 3D photography.


