#### A VOICE FROM DOWN UNDER


It's beginning to get hot again as it was most of January and February - in the 80's.



#### IN MEMORY

<u>PELL HOLLINGSHEAD</u> - a Birmingham resident for 40 years, joined the Club in June 1987, died March 12 at age 70. He graduated from the University of Michigan Law School in 1943 and was a member of the Delta Kappa Epsilon and the State Bar of Michigan.

Pell was a humanist and active in community and church work as evidenced by serving on the Birmingham Board of Education 1962-1970 and subsequent citizens' advisory councils. He was president of St. Anne's Mead Retirement Home, active in BASCC and Friends of the Baldwin Public Library. His family hosted many exchange students, a caring, busy life.

Cast in the same mold is wife Carol, who so ably manages the Clubs hostesses and is loved by all members for her cheerfulness and as an expert bridge substitute.

<u>LEROY BRAISTED</u> - Life Member, died February 27 in the Georgian-Bloomfield Nursing Home. He had not been seen around our Club in some years due to serious walking difficulties, including a broken hip. He had been living alone in his Piety Hill apartment, where he did his own housework and enjoyed it. He regularly turned down offers of help from friends and especially from the family of his son, LeRoy W., who are Birmingham residents.

Roy was 97 and had lived in Birmingham 65 years. Many of us remember the lively party celebrating the 65th wedding anniversary of Roy and his wife, Neenah, in the social room of the apartment building in 1983. Neenah died in 1985.

Both were members of the Birmingham Village Players, joining in 1939. When Roy appeared in tryouts for a Christmas play, he was quickly cast for the role of Santa Claus, and thereafter was official Santa for every Players Christmas party. He was President in 1963-64.

In his career, Roy was an electrical engineer, having earned his degree at the University of Michigan. He founded his own firm, Braisted and Bair, who sold heavy electrical products to utility companies and other industrial firms. He retired when he joined our Club, in 1973.

COLIN GRANT-WATTERS - joined our Club in 1968 and became a Life member in 1984. He was a Birmingham resident 51 years. With an international background, Colin was a man with great appreciation of our country and its political structure. His background and the assurance he showed whenever he took the platform identified him as a man of distinction.

Born in India in 1899, he got his schooling there, which included degrees in construction and electrical engineering. While still in India, he was appointed by Perrin and Marshall, of New York, as engineer on several building projects in India and other Asian countries. In 1928, he came to the U. S. to work for the Tidewater Construction Company. In later years he was a consultant for Travelers Insurance Company and some of our biggest industries.

Colin moved to Birmingham in 1938 and quickly became interested in community affairs. He was appointed to the Board of Zoning Appeals for 15 years and then to the first committee to look into Senior Housing.

He was a faithful attendant to the SMC and served as Legislative Chairman for a number of years. Colin was very interested in government affairs and regularly attended the City Commission meetings. He kept the Club well informed as to its activities and of the Birmingham School taxes and home assessments. He was a good speaker and liked to be heard.
