## IN MEMORY

WILLIAM J. BROWN, who joined the Club in 1978, died December 1. He was our Corresponding Secretary in 1985, 1986, and part of 1987. Bill's career was in the various areas of financial and business management of corporations. He started as an accountant, and moved up into phases of management that included auditing and organizational planning for various departments of a business. His last thirty years were with several divisions of General Motors. Bill was a member of the Economic Club of Detroit and the First Presbyterian Church of Birmingham. A memorial service was held at the church December 5. The family suggests that memorial tributes may be sent to the church or to the Senior Men's Club.

REINHOLD C. ZEIDLER, who joined the Club in 1969, died December 15. He was one of the automotive industry's most respected engineers, spending his lifetime in that field. He retired from Borg-Warner when he joined our club, but frequently was called on for consultation by his former employers and others in the industry. Many of us remember the annual parties he held for members, who met on his boat for cocktails, then enjoyed luncheon at the Detroit Yacht Club. He was a Life Member of that club, as well as a 60-year member of the Society of Automotive Engineers. He would have become a Life Member of the Senior Men's Club this month on his 85th birthday. A memorial service was held at the Vasu, Rodgers, and Connell Funeral Home December 29.

JOSEPH R. HENNINGER, a member since 1973, died December 27. When he joined our Club he quickly began attending every meeting - and every bridge game. In his third year he was made Vice Chairman of Cards - a post he held until 1978. In 1979 and 1980 he was Bridge Chairman. For five years he refrained from Chairmanship but was a regular high score player. He accepted the Bridge Chairman job again in 1986 and served until his illness in 1987. In his profession, Joe was an electrical engineer with the famous Albert Kahn architectural organization for 30 years up to his retirement in 1969. An extra activity of Joe's was his work toward safety on the water through his membership in the Birmingham Power Squadron, where he taught navigation. A memorial service was held at the Vasu, Rodgers, and Connell Funeral Home December 29. Burial was in Glen Eden Memorial Gardens, Livonia.
