Applicants are eligible to play at all sessions even if it is not their date to attend meetings.


APPLICANTS GOLF LEAGUE -- JOE STEELE, CHAIRMAN

I'm taking this opportunity to bring you up to date on the status of our Capital Campaign. As of June 25, the House has received a total of \$1,284,000. This represents 53% of the total goal of \$2,600,000. We must raise \$800,000 to receive a Kresge Foundation grant of \$400,000. We still have a long way to go despite our progress.

Senior men and applicants are responding well. 127 members have pledged \$56,775, some for as much as \$25,000. Twenty-five applicants have pledged \$3,635. Thank you one and all.

Those who have not pledged yet, remember that you may spread your pledge over three to five years. Please join us with your support.

IN MEMORY

CLYDE TYNDALL, who joined us in 1980, died June 2. He retired in 1969 after 36 years with the United States Lake Survey of the Corps of Army Engineers. He was chief of the Chart Compilation Branch at the time of his retirement. He started his career as a draftsman, working on plans for the Birmingham train station. Later, he worked for the D&C Navigation Company on plans for their expanding fleet of passenger ships Then came his years with the Lake Survey. After his retirement he became President of the Detroit Federal Employees Credit Union. Memorial services were held at Mariner's Church on the Detroit waterfront.

MARCUS W. FROST, a Life Member, who joined in 1976, died June 8. Dr. Frost was a dentist throughout his career in the Detroit area. He was a member of the Michigan Dental Association, and one of the early members of Birmingham's Senior Recreation program at the Ice Sports Arena, which was later replaced by BASCC. Funeral services were held June 11 at Vasu, Rodgers and Connell Funeral Home, and burial was at Acacia Park Cemetery.

JACK DECKER (Jacob S.), who joined our Club in 1974, died June 16. Jack was our Treasurer in 1980 and 1981, and his friendly smile made it a pleasure to pay our dues. His career was in electrical engineering, after his B.E.E. degree from Ohio State University. Jack was born in Toledo and worked there 24 years for Electric Auto-Lite as a sales engineer. In 1958 he went with Essex Wire Corporation in Detroit. He retired as Product Sales Manager in 1973. Memorial services were held at First Presbyterian Church, Birmingham, June 19.

THOMAS J. MILLS, who joined us in 1979, died June 19. He was a pharmacist, starting his career for a couple of years in Ann Arbor, then coming to Birmingham where he was a pharmacist for Wilson Drug at Maple and Woodward for 17 years. In 1946 he opened his own drug store, Mills Pharmacy, on Maple at Chesterfield. He continued his ownership after he retired from active work in 1979. He is survived by his wife, Jacqueline, and two sons. Services were held at Vasu, Rodgers and Connell, and burial was at White Chapel.

WARREN H. SMITH, a former member of the Senior Men's Club, died in June. Details were not available. He joined in 1974 and resigned in 1986.
