# BLOOD TEST SERVICE NOW AVAILABLE IN YOUR HOME BY A PHLEBOTOMIST

Here's an answer to a problem, if you or someone in your home is sick; the doctor needs blood tests, but you can't get to the doctor's office. Member Ed Clarke had that problem. After a lot of checking with doctors, hospitals, and other sources, he finally located a qualified person who comes to the home with her equipment. She is Tina Jablynski; phone (residence) 494-4157; (office) 1-682-6742. You will have to make your own arrangements for her fee, since Medicare does You will not cover it. Before engaging her you need your doctor's order for the blood samples needed. The Phlebotomist puts the blood samples in vials, labels them, and delivers them to a lab.



GAWLPHINE WITH THE SENIORS: SEASON OPENS APRIL 18 -- BY A. RAY SWARTZ

Seniors are you ready? The 1985 golf season starts Thursday, April 18 at Springdale Golf Course at 9:01 a.m. The city informs me the course will be ready (weather permitting). Will you be ready? With only 26 showing up at the Golf Dome March 21, most of you must be ready! The last session at the Dome is April 4 with the Pro's in attendance. The price is right, \$5.00 for two hours of swinging.

The fee for golf is the same as for 1984: \$3.00 for 9 holes of golf (\$2.50 for greens fees and \$.50 towards prizes and incidentals). Electric carts are rented for \$8.00 for nine holes (two to a cart), \$11.00 for 18 holes. Seniors (residents of Birmingham) may play all weekdays for \$2.50 for nine holes, \$5.00 on weekends. Non-residents may play as a guest for \$6.00 weekdays and \$6.50 weekends. ALL RESIDENTS MUST HAVE A LEISURE ACTIVITY PASS! These are available at the office at 851 South Eton; \$5.00 for new passes, \$3.00 for renewal.

The Golf League has 26 starting times at Springdale Golf Course for the 1985 season, beginning at 9:01 a.m. and ending at 11:56 a.m. These starting times will accommodate 104 golfers.

In 1984, 103 golfers signed up. An average of 72, or 70% played in the summer months. The Golf Committee anticipates an additional 30 to 35 golfers from the new members inducted in late 1984 and those inducted in 1985 before the season begins.

At the same rate of play, the additional golfers will fill up the available starting times. The Committee urges golfers not listed in regular starting times to sign up to play in foursomes at the regular starting times still available.

Golfers who choose not to play in Regular starting time foursomes, are given a number at the sign-in table and are filled into foursomes as openings occur each week. Lenghty waits will sometimes occur.

Players in foursomes  $\overline{\text{must}}$  sign in at least 15 minutes before their starting time. If a  $\overline{\text{player}}$  is late signing in, his spot will be filled from the individual waiting list. The late player will be given a number and take his turn on the individual list.

A Preliminary Schedule is posted on the bulletin board. Add your name, either to the Foursome List or the Individual List.

With your cooperation, we (the Committee) can eliminate some of the trying times we had in previous years and make golfing more pleasant for all.
