Club Donations To House Up A Little from '91

With time running out on 1992, Chick Holmes and his Community House liaison committee are working hard to help that organization achieve its Annual Fund Drive Goal.

In mid-September, The Community House was still about \$75,000 short of the drive's \$215,000 target.

Senior Men's Club members and applicants showed a slight increase in total contributions over last year, with members providing \$25,708 this year compared to \$26,942 in '91, while applicants showed a slight increase with \$9,159 versus 91's \$7,148.

The total is \$34,867 for 1992 compared to last year's \$34,080. The number of givers was also close, 477 to 466 in 1991.

Chick and his group are pushing to increase all these 1992 figures. They ask your help if you have not already made a contribution.

49-Year Wait for Diploma From Oxford Ends for Walt

A Senior Men's member has received a diploma, of sorts, that he earned at Balliol College, Oxford University, England, in 1943 -- fortynine years ago.

Walter T. Murphy, then a Lieutenant stationed England with the U.S. Army 8th Air Force, signed on for a residency leave-course in U.S.-British diplomatic history sponsored by Oxford University and the U.S. military. At the end of the course, officials of the College presented each student graduation at a breakfast with tea Certificate of Completion. subsequent snafues incident to troop movements and the return of the 8th Air U.S.A., the following Germany's surrender, Murphy lost his prized piece of scholastic parchment from Oxford. When

he got around to asking for a duplicate, the answer was that war-time records were in such a shambles from German bombings, no meaningful certificate could be issued.

But last week, 49 years after the educational program at Balliol, and the exchange of correspondence between the former Air Corps Officer and the college, Murphy got his replacement diploma in the of handwritten a certification from Balliol College Dean Archivist, Dr. John Jones, M.A., D. Phil, C Chem, FRSC, Fr Hist S. In a personal letter with the certificate, Dean Jones wrote:

"We do not have set forms for our certificates and on the rare occasions when I am asked to provide a certificate of attendance, I do it in my own handwriting ... With warm good wishes,


