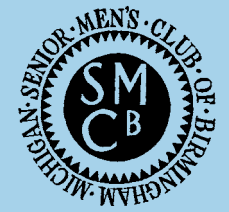

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Bob Rossi: A Man with Two Careers

Bob Rossi, Chairman of the Club's Hospitality Committee, is one of those rare individuals who can look back at two distinguished careers during his lifetime.

The first career began when Bob joined the Detroit Police Department, a relationship that would extend 26 years. Bob worked his way up the ranks from Patrolman to Lieutenant. He was involved in virtually every aspect of law enforcement. He earned a Bachelor's Degree in Public Administration and a Master's Degree in Education, both from Wayne State University. He has taught at the Detroit Police Academy, the Detroit Criminal Justice Institute, Wayne State and Oakland Community College. Throughout his career he attended and presented literally dozens of courses in areas as diverse as Jail Management, Ethical Awareness, and Auto Theft Investigation.



Career number two began when Bob joined the Oakland County Medical Examiner's staff following his retirement from the Detroit Police Department. In this position Bob, was part of a team of investigators who assisted the Medical Examiner. Their mission was to probe violent, accidental, sudden and unexplained deaths. The high regard in which Bob was held by his colleagues is reflected in a newspaper article which described him as "curious, thorough, and persistent."

Bob was raised in Detroit and graduated from Denby High School. He then attended Michigan State University where he competed in football and track. He played football under legendary coaches Biggie Munn and Duffy Daugherty. The 1952 team won the National Championship Title.

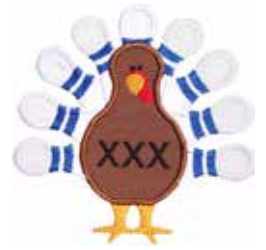
An extra game was played the following day – the Cubs won the game and the pennant and Fred Merkle was forever known as "Bonehead!" Congratulations, Pete!

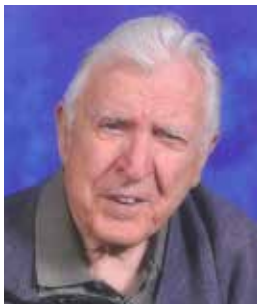

Senior Health Matters Evaluation and Treatment of Elevated Cholesterol Levels

People older than 80 years comprise an increasing segment of the population with elevated cholesterol levels and risk of cardiovascular disease. Because there is substantial biologic and functional variation among older patients, the decision for the use of statin medications differs in older patients relative to younger ones. A review of the medical literature on the evaluation and treatment of patients 75 and older was published on September 17 in the Journal of the American Medical Association. The authors concluded:

- No randomized clinical trials of statins or any other medication for elevated cholesterol included persons older than 80 years at the start of the trial.
- Findings in 75-80 year olds support statin treatment for prevention of atherosclerotic cardiovascular disease (ASCVD) and probably in diabetics without ASCVD.
- Harms from statin drugs are not increased in older people so their use in prevention is possible but should be started before age 80.
- Because people older than 80 are functionally and biologically different, have varying life expectancy, may have frailty or concurrent illnesses and may take multiple medications, the decisions to treat with statins must be individualized but are not supported by high quality evidence.

Bob and his wife Jackie reside in Birmingham. They have four children.

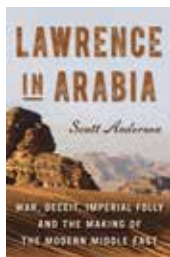

"I found your lips close to mine, so I kissed you and you didn't mind it at all"

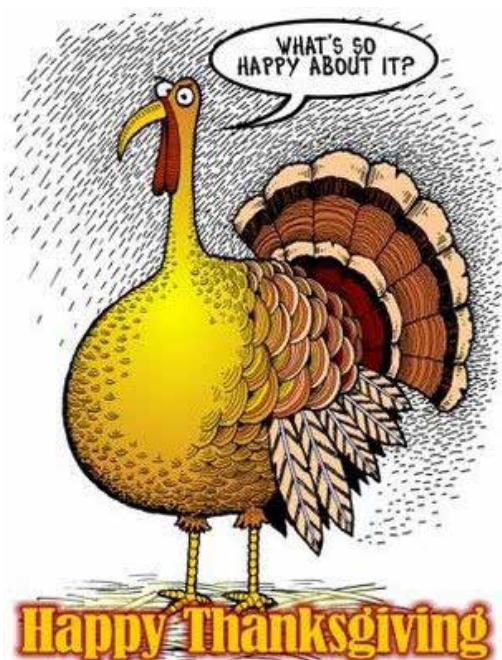
