#### IN MEMORY

LLOYD L. LAKE, SR., who joined the Senior Men's Club in 1976, died on March 25 at the age of 86. He opened Lake Jewelers in Birmingham in 1946 which he owned and operated until retirement. The store was sold in December, 1982.
