
Cliff Snedeker – A Man for All Seasons

Year-End Golf Report

The season started well in January 2018 as we again returned to the Oakland Yard Golf Dome to practice our swings and shake off the winter doldrums and enjoy lunch at Hero's. A new golf pro gave us swing and grip instruction in hopes that our elusive chase for birdies and pars would return in the spring.

The Annual Charlie Travers Chipping Contest was won by Joe Schulenberg. The Annual Charlie Travers Putting Contest was won by Kirby Callam. We will once again return to the Dome on Thursday, January 3, 2019!

After three months of agonizing winter weather and delays in the opening of the course at Springdale, we stepped up to the tee box with thoughts of low scores in our heads!

We managed to get in over 330 rounds from 59 golfers at Springdale with Greg McComas recording the lowest scoring average of 37.3 and over 500 rounds from 62 golfers at Lincoln Hills with Maynard Timm recording the lowest scoring average of 38.9! I guess the rest of us mere mortals will need to return to the dome for more practice!

Maynard Timm was the only player to make the "Over Thirty" club as he played 15 rounds at each golf course. Last year there were five of us that reached that distinction! And once again, Maynard Timm broke the bank winning the BIG BUCKS at hole #6 at Springdale for closest to the pin and making the putt at a minimum distance of 6 feet!

On Wednesday, November 7, at 10:30AM we will discuss the book "Alan Turing: The

Enigma," by Andrew Hodges and Douglas Hofstadter. This *New York Times* bestseller tells the true story of Alan Turing, who created a computer during the dark days of World War II to break the German Enigma ciphers and give the Allies a crucial leg up in the war. Later, despite his wartime service, his homosexuality eventually led to his arrest and subjection to a humiliating treatment program. Ray Shapiro will lead the discussion.

On Monday, November 19 at 3:00PM, we will discuss the book "Code Talker: The First and Only Memoir By One of the Original Navajo Code Talkers of World War II," by Chester Nez and Judith Schiese Avila. Chester Nez was the English name the Navajo boy was assigned in kindergarten. While in school, he was punished for speaking his native language. But discrimination didn't stop Chester from answering the call to defend his country after Pearl Harbor as a Marine. During World War II, the Japanese managed to crack every code the United States used until the Marines turned to their Navajo recruits to use their native language to develop new code. They created the only unbroken code in modern warfare and helped assure victory for the United States in the Pacific Theater. Roger Timm will lead the discussion.


