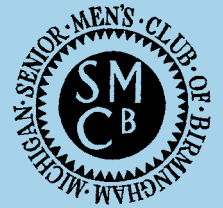

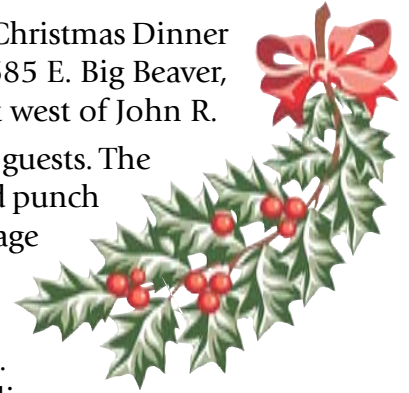
Christmas Dinner Dance

Dinner entries will be one of three fine choices. Please make your selection when you purchase your tickets.

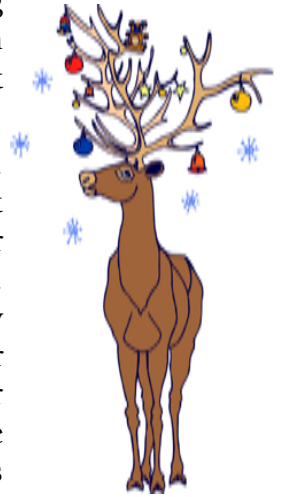
- Medallions of Veal with mushroom sauce

Executive Board Actions

At the meeting of October 20, 2009, the Executive Board approved several recommendations made by the Policy Committee, as follows:

- Reinstatement of the club dress code for Friday meetings. Approved attire will be:
 - Suit or sport coat
 - Collared shirt
 - Tie (four-in-hand, bow or bolo)

This change will be effective with the first meeting in November 2009. The president will be authorized to relax this code during the summer months. This code will be documented in the Policy and Procedure manual.

Mark your calendars for January 21!

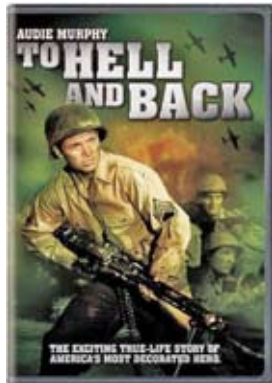

It is the true-life account of the military career of this most decorated soldier in World War II. The 110 lb, 5' 5 1/2" Texas teenager enlisted in the Army Infantry in 1942. Beginning in Casablanca, Morocco he fought in Sicily, the Italian mainland at Anzio and the Italian Alps, Southern France and eventually Germany. His many acts of bravery and heroism earned him 33 of the highest medals the US could bestow including two Presidential Citations, the Distinguished Service Cross and the Congressional Medal of Honor. It was said that he received every US medal available at the time and 5 of them more than once. Join us for this action packed "war film" about a true American hero.

Book Reading Groups

On Wednesday, November 4 at 10:30AM, we will be discussing "Lords of Finance—The Bankers Who Broke the World" by Liaquat Ahamed. With penetrating insights for today, this vital history of the world economic collapse of the late 1920s offers unforgettable portraits of the men whose personal and professional actions as heads of their respective central banks changed the course of the twentieth century. It is commonly believed that the Great Depression that began in 1929 resulted from a confluence of events beyond any one person's or government's control. In fact, as Liaquat Ahamed reveals, it was the decisions taken by a small number of central bankers that were the primary cause of the economic meltdown, the effects of which set the stage for World War II and reverberated for decades.

On Monday, November 16 at 3:00PM we will be discussing "The Coldest Winter" by David Halberstam. Halberstam considered "The Coldest Winter" the best book he ever wrote, the culmination of 45 years of writing about America's postwar foreign policy. Up until now, the Korean War has been the black hole of modern American history. Halberstam gives us a masterful narrative of the political decisions and miscalculations on both sides. He charts the disastrous path that led to the massive entry of Chinese forces near the Yalu, that caught Douglas MacArthur and his soldiers by surprise. At the same time, Halberstam provides us with his trademark highly evocative narrative journalism, chronicling the crucial battles with reportage of the highest order.

Masonic Honors

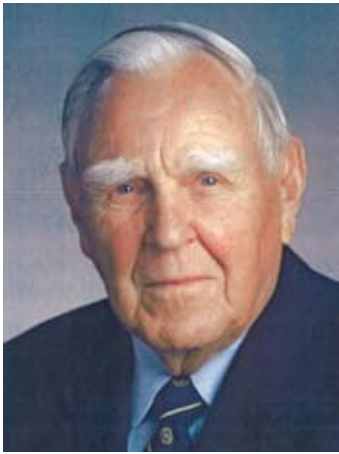


Ray Swartz and Bill Shaffmaster

Two venerable club members recently received recognition for long time membership and their many contributions to their Masonic lodges. Ray

Swartz came up from Buckeye country to receive his 50 year membership award, while Bill Shaffmaster was recognized for an amazing 70 years of service.

George R. Mosher—Founder of Oakland Community College



George Mosher, a 17-year member of the Senior Men's Club, became a Life Member three years ago. He is a very busy man. George is a retired GM attorney working nearly full time at a large law firm in Southfield. He also swims nearly every day with some of our members, plays a good game of golf and is an avid snow skier. On top of all this, George is a tireless

worker, dedicated to advancing his passion – Oakland Community College. Because of his extra busy schedule, George seldom gets a chance to join us at our Friday luncheon meetings and other club activities.

Fascinating Background—

Born in 1921, George was raised with his family on a cattle ranch and dairy farm in South Dakota. Like his brothers, he worked very hard as a young cowboy roping steers and milking cows. During the 30's, the Great Depression and the terrible dust storms in the Midwest eventually wiped them out. To survive, the family headed for the west coast and worked as sharecroppers on farms in Oregon. Besides doing farm chores, George managed to finish high school and work his way through the University of Oregon. He later entered the U.S. Navy and served as an officer on board a destroyer during WWII and Korea.

Always an admirer of Abraham Lincoln, George decided to become a lawyer. Aided by the GI Bill of Rights, he was accepted at a very prestigious law school – Columbia University in New York City.

Graduating with 'flying colors,' he then joined a New York law firm. His big break came when he solved a very interesting case involving copyright infringement between two rival comic books – Superman and Captain Marvel. This accomplishment promoted him to be assigned to the very coveted General Motors account.

On a vacation trip back home in Oregon, George met a very charming lady named Doris Dodge. After a whirlwind courtship, they married, and Doris joined George in his New York apartment.

George continued to impress General Motors with his legal expertise—especially in the area of patents and copyrights. In due time, GM asked him to join their legal staff in Detroit. For George and Doris, it was off to Michigan...and they

found the home of their dreams in Birmingham. Later they were blessed with two sons--George III and Doyle. George III is now a top ranked ski instructor in Idaho, while Doyle is a builder in the Birmingham area.

Oakland Community College—

During his career with GM, George and Doris saw a growing need for a top-quality and affordable two-year college here in Oakland County. Michigan community colleges at that time covered about one-third of their costs by tuition, about one-third by state aid, and about one third by local millage. Their instructors were not graduate students; they were dedicated teachers who had at least a master's degree in their field. Their transfer students who went on to a four-year institution tended to do better academically than those who had been on the four-year campus for their first two years. Working with several others, George and Doris contacted various Michigan officials for needed land and other resources. As luck would have it, an abandoned NIKE missile site in Auburn Hills became available at a token price. Taxpayers approved a small increase in millage and construction was underway. In due time dignitaries attended the grand opening of the first beautiful new OCC campus – Auburn Hills. One of the fine new buildings was named in George's honor. Another building in the area was named in honor of George's hard-working wife, Doris.

The new Auburn Hills facilities were then staffed with experienced professors and other well-qualified personnel. Word quickly spread and soon this first Oakland Community College location was bustling with hundreds of proud students.

Since then, other beautiful OCC campuses have been conveniently located throughout Oakland County. These include Highland Lakes in Waterford, Orchard Ridge in Farmington Hills, and campuses in Southfield, Royal Oak and Pontiac. George recently attended another groundbreaking ceremony for a \$25 million expansion at the Southfield campus. Purpose – to fulfill urgent needs – particularly in the area of nurse's training.

Today, thousands of students are proudly enrolled to the point that OCC is now the 4th largest college in Michigan. Only Michigan State, U of M and Wayne State have larger enrollments. Sadly, George's wife Doris is no longer with us to enjoy their achievements. On Friday, October 23, Oakland Community College named its OCC Foundation Building for his late wife, Doris Mosher.

Only one reader, Chuck Basch, remembered that Freddie Slack's theme song was "Strange Cargo."

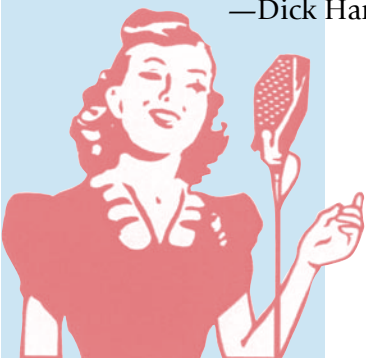
This month we have an old fashioned romantic ballad as a challenge for you - a Gershwin tune, with these lyrics:
