IN MEMORY - These are active members who died in July and August.

Don W. Fleser joined the club in July, 1971. He died July 11, 1980. Interested in most of our activities, Don was on the special events committee in 1976 and 1977. In his business career he was with the Fisher Body Division of GM for forty years. He became a material supervisor, then plant superintendent, and later a plant manager. He was General Factory Manager over six trim fabricating plants from 1959 to 1967.

James J. Kelly joined the club in January, 1973. He died August 1, 1980. He was on our Callers Committee, 1975-1980, and on the Membership Committee, 1978-79. He was the founder of Kelly Insurance Agency, of Birmingham. A charter member of the Birmingham Lions Club, he was its President in 1940.

William J. Krueger joined the club in February, 1972. He died August 11. His profession was automotive body designer, and during his career he was associated with several companies. He remained in the body design field for 34 years until retirement.

Arthur B. Baynes joined the club in June, 1964. He died August 20. He was a life member of Masonic Lodge #44, F & AM, and a member of the High-12 Club. He had been manager of the Lancaster Hills Golf Course.

George W. Moughler joined the club in October, 1970. He died August 26. He was an active golfer with our golf league until declining eyesight interrupted his game about three years ago. His business was underground irrigation systems on golf courses, a career he followed for thirty years.
