Applications To Be Limited To 25 a Year

A plan aimed at reducing the waiting period for membership now being experienced by applicants to the Senior Men's Club was approved by the club's Executive Board at its meeting on Jan. 14.

The new policy, to be enforced by the Membership Committee, provides that


- limit (1)A of applicants will be accepted during the year beginning 1992. The acceptances will be based first on applied, accepted until the minimum is reached.
- (2) Hereafter, no one club member can sponsor or cosponsor more than one applicant every three years.

In addition, the policy of one-a-month attendance at meetings by applicants will be continued.

The Board acted on the recommendations of the Policy Committee, headed by former president Blaine Gordon. In its report, the Policy group pointed out "the long waiting period is occasioned by the fact that the applicant has grown substantially in recent years."

It added:

"In 1991, 69 applicants were accepted...while some applicants were dropped...currently there are 387 applicants for

admission to a club with 400 regular members and about 60 life members...In 1991 only 26 new members could be admitted...to replace those resigning, dying or becoming life members.

"...Various alternatives have been explored to meet this problem. However, all of them face the physical limitations of Community House facilities which restrict safe comfortable attendance at any one meeting to about 265...The consensus judgment was to limit total applicants accepted possible membership to 25 in any one year, or about the number of deaths and resignations encountered in recent years.
