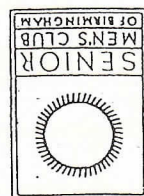
- Collection of 1991 dues will begin in September.

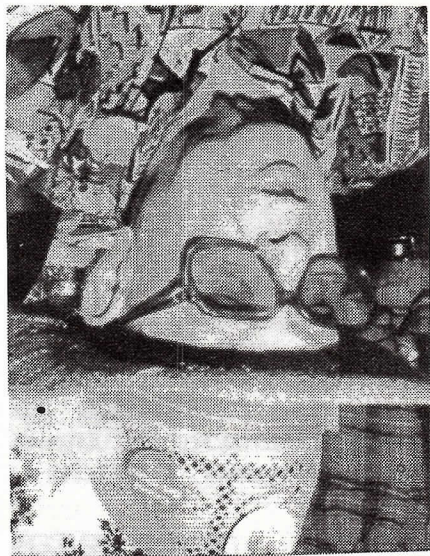
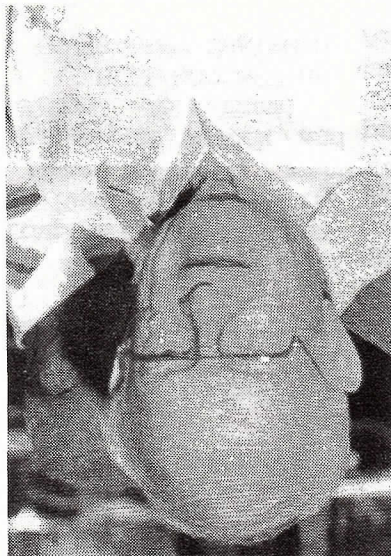
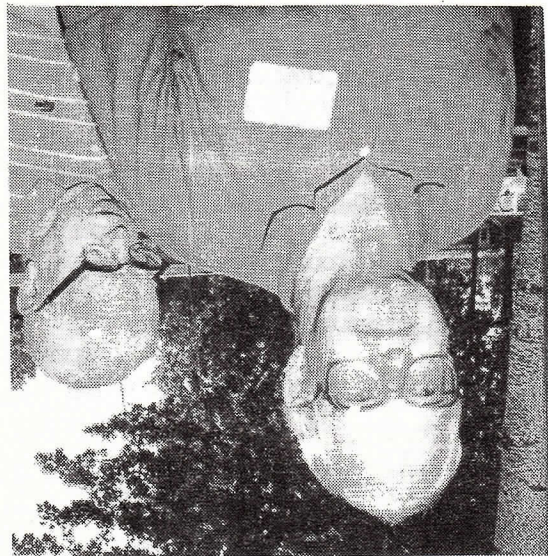
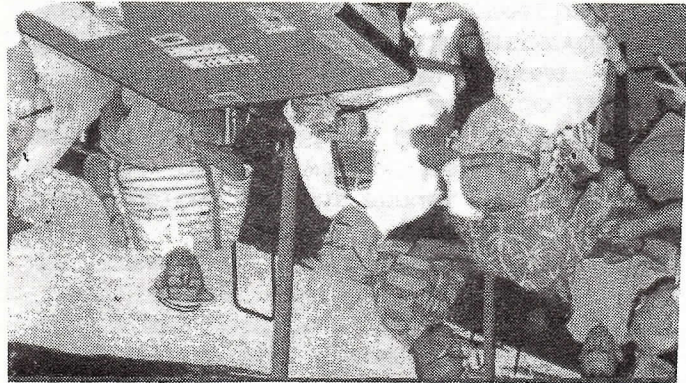
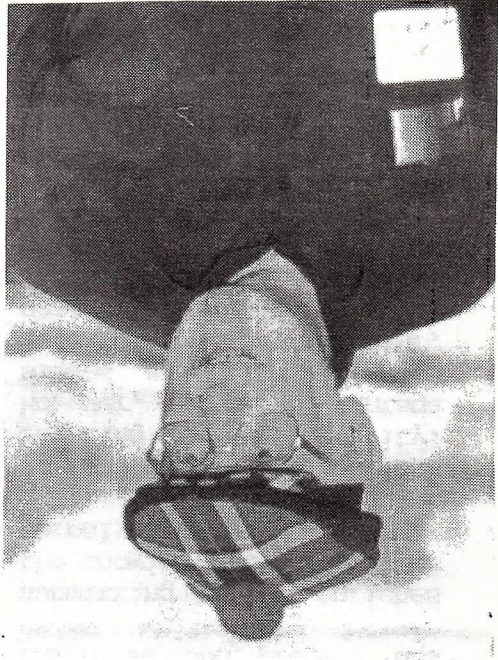
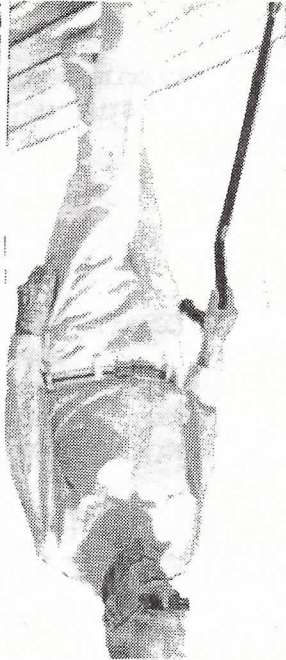
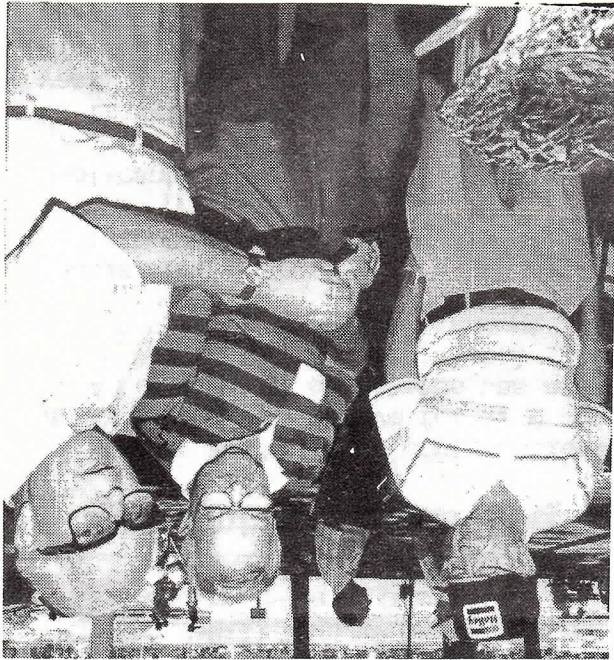
Senior Men's Club contributions to the Community House Annual Fund Drive for 1990 continue to increase. As of July 31 our status was as shown below:

If you have not made a contribution this calendar year, please consider doing so as the percentage of gifts is usually much higher.

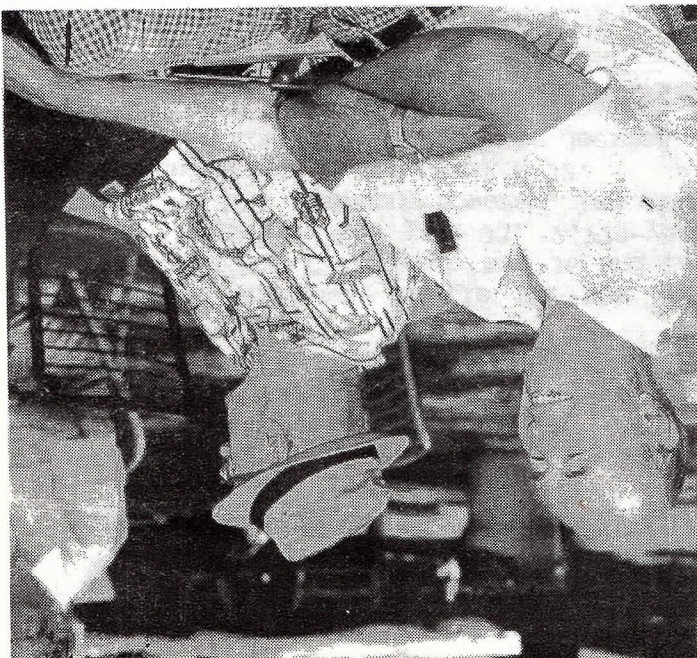
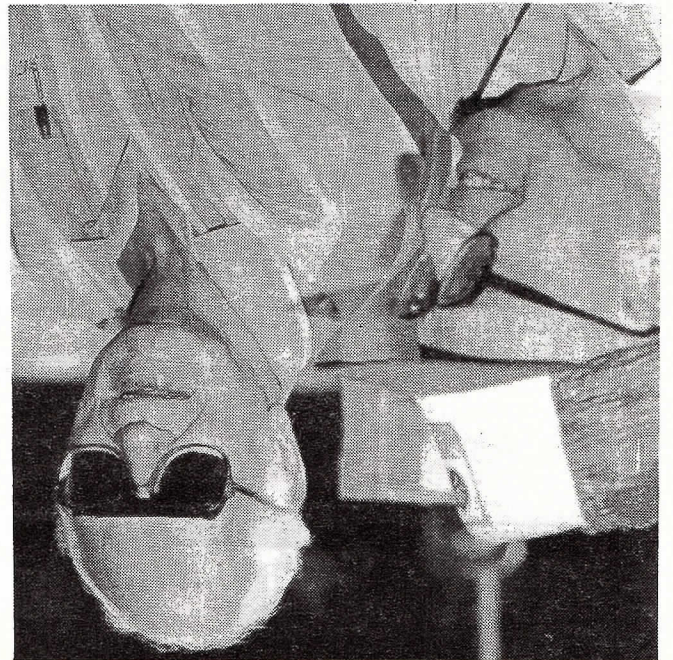
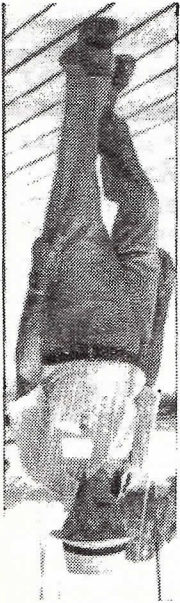
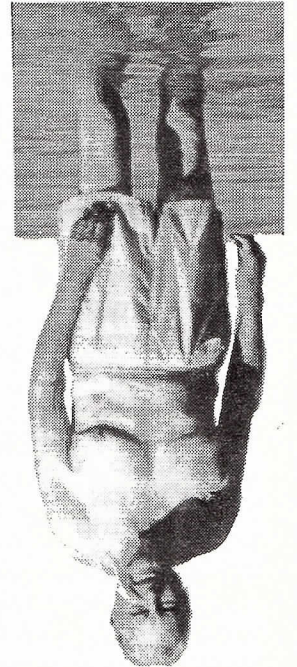
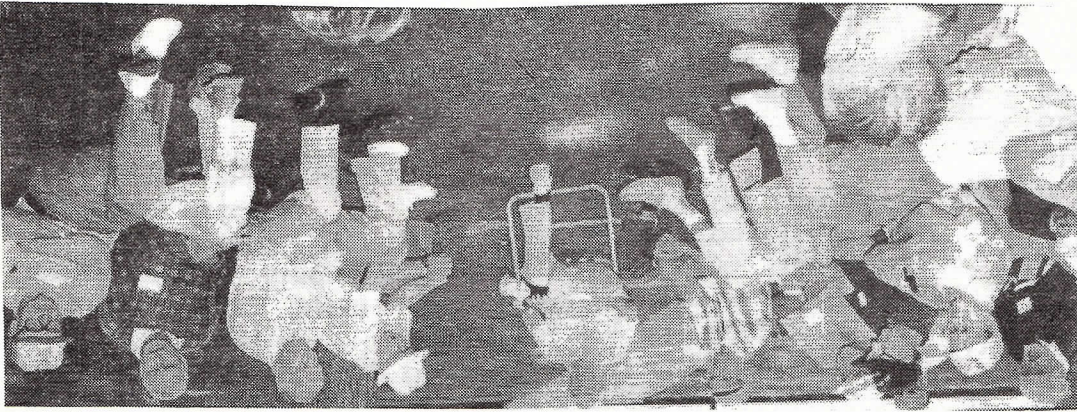
