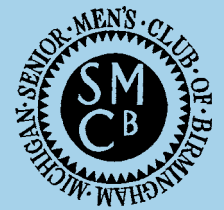

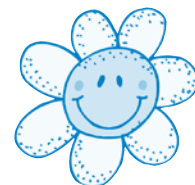

## Book Reading Groups

On Wednesday, April 7 at 10:30AM we will be discussing "Getting Ghost" by Luke Bergman. This is an intimate and revealing look at the lives of two young black drug dealers in Detroit, and a bracing and original analysis of the forces that shape their world. This sensitive and brave book takes readers into the tragedy of deindustrialization and ethnic discrimination in America to the real lives of those trapped in the illegal drug economy. Bergman forces us to face the contradictions of drugs, discrimination and poverty in our Detroit city. In telling their stories and those of their families, Bergman brilliantly explores the complex contradictions of Detroit's status and proudly and uniquely claimed by its predominantly black residents, where African Americans firmly hold municipal power, but also suffer the legacy of lost manufacturing jobs and white flight.

On Monday, April 19 at 3:00PM we will be discussing "Breaking News" by Martin Fletcher. Fletcher's experience as a seasoned foreign correspondent provides substance in this intriguing book. Finding himself in the middle of conflicts, wars and other devastating predicaments, Fletcher, NBC's Middle East correspondent and Tel Aviv bureau chief, brings a brutal honesty to his prose that reveals some of the moral challenges faced by those who report these events. Grappling with the age-old field reporter's conundrum-do something or simply observe-Fletcher concludes that there is no easy answer because both come with unwanted consequences.

# Senior Health Matters

Salt intake by men has increased 48% since the 1970s. On the average, we take in about 3900 mg sodium a day. Skimping on salt can save lives and money. Cutting salt by 3 g/day (1200 mg sodium/day) would save up to \$24 billion in healthcare costs and reduce the yearly number of strokes by 32,000, heart attacks by 44,000 and new cases of heart disease by 60,000. (1)



A 10% decrease in sodium intake could translate into a decrease of \$32 billion dollars in medical costs and a million lives saved from heart attack and stroke. (2)

Salt (sodium chloride) is 40% sodium by weight and is the main source of sodium in food. However, there are stealth forms of sodium in our diet including monosodium glutamate (MSG), baking soda and baking powder (sodium bicarbonate), disodium phosphate, sodium alginate and sodium nitrate or nitrite. Only 11% of the sodium in the average U.S. diet comes from adding salt or other salt containing condiments to foods while cooking or eating. The majority (77%) comes from eating prepared or processed food that contains the mineral so you have to read the "Nutrition Facts" label for how much sodium is in each serving. The American Heart Association recommends that our intake be no more than 2300 mg of sodium per day—about the amount of sodium in a teaspoon of salt (5.8 g salt). Blacks, middle age and older adults and those already diagnosed with hypertension should take in even less; no more than 1500 mg sodium per day, which is  $\frac{3}{4}$  teaspoon. Thus, our intake should be only 65% of the daily value (%DV= 2300 mg) on the label which corresponds to 1500 mg daily sodium intake. What can we do to achieve this goal?

1. Reduce our intake of pickles served at the SMC luncheon along with other high salt foods such as ham, bacon, sausage, corned beef, pastrami, hot dogs and bologna.
2. No table salt added to our food during cooking or eating.
3. Read the labels on all prepared foods and processed foods.
4. Use salt free spices, lemon or vinegar for flavor.
