

Joe Knollenberg: Three Decades in Insurance Business, Sixteen Years in Congress

Joe Knollenberg exemplifies the American dream in many ways. He is the grandson of immigrants, a successful businessman, and a member of the U.S. House of Representatives for eight terms.

Joe was born in 1933 in Mattoon, Illinois, the fifth of thirteen children. He graduated from Eastern Illinois University in 1955, majoring in Political Science. Following graduation he went on to serve in the U.S. Army from 1955 to 1957. He then spent more than three decades as an insurance agent and executive, initially for New York Life and Sears. He established his own agency in the late 1980's in Troy, Michigan.



During this period Joe became active in the Oakland County Republican Party, serving as chairman from 1978 to 1982. He was then selected to run in place of Congressman William Broomfield who was retiring from his seat in the 11th District. Joe won the Republican Party nomination for the U.S. House of Representatives in the August primary by 13 percentage points and then went on to win the general election in November 1992. This began an impressive run of election victories.



Monday Golf



He was brought up and spent his early life in Europe, including earning a B.Sc. degree in Electrical Engineering in England. He started a career with Ford Motor Company in Dearborn in 1955. Being fluent in five languages resulted in Bernard having many overseas assignments with Ford.



He was first posted in Alexandria, Egypt. After two years, he was appointed District Manager in Athens, Greece. Next he was transferred to Bangkok, Thailand as District Manager for Southeast markets. He then moved to Lagos, Nigeria covering West Africa.

After 12 years of overseas assignments, Bernard requested posting in the U.S. to ensure a proper education for his son. He had assignments in South America and the Middle East before joining Ford Corporate Strategy, principally covering China, Japan and Korea. Bernard retired in November, 1989 after 35 years with Ford. His wife, Julie, passed away last August. His son is an attorney, living in Greenwich, Connecticut. He joined the SMC in 2005 and has been most active. Congratulations, Bernard!



Senior Health Matters Mediterranean Diet May Help Slow Aging

Fruits, vegetables, nuts, legumes, unrefined grains, olive oil and fish with a moderate intake of alcohol and low intake of dairy products and poultry are the key



components of the Mediterranean diet. The diet has well known antioxidant and anti-inflammatory effects that could balance out the bad effects of smoking and obesity.

The health benefits of the Mediterranean diet are:

- Reduction in overall mortality
- Cardiovascular disease prevention
- Reversal of Metabolic Syndrome (reduces blood glucose, blood pressure, triglycerides and waist circumference and raises HDL cholesterol)
- Reverses genetic risk for stroke
- Reduces cognitive decline
- Lower risk of peripheral artery disease
- Regresses plaque volume in the carotid arteries

Whether the Mediterranean diet is better than a healthy low-fat diet like the Ornish or Pritikin diet has not yet been demonstrated. We cannot say "Nuts to the low-fat diet."



Book Reading Groups

On Wednesday, April 1 at 10:30AM, we will discuss Michael Blanding's *The Map Thief*—the gripping story of an esteemed rare-map dealer who made millions stealing precious maps. This book includes a report of an interview with the thief, E. Forbes Smiley III, before he went quiet, as well as interviews with dealers Smiley worked with and librarians he stole from. Smiley was arrested in 2005, right after he had delicately torn maps out of rare books in Yale University's Beinecke Library reading room. Last October 8 the author of this book—Michael Blanding—gave a lecture at Yale to talk about what he had learned about Smiley and the rare-map world while researching and writing *The Map Thief*.



On Monday, April 20 at 3:00PM we will discuss Mirta Ojito's *Hunting Season: Immigration and Murder in an All-American Town*, on. In November of 2008, Marcelo Lucero, a 37 year-old Ecuadorean immigrant, was brutally attacked and murdered by a group of teenagers as he walked the streets of Patchogue, a quiet Long Island town. The teenage attackers were out hunting for "beaners"—their slur for Latinos—and Lucero became another victim of the anti-immigration fever spreading in the United States. This violent act rocked the community while transforming a fairly typical teenage boy into a convicted killer.

Inform your significant other and mark your calendar now! On Tuesday, April 21, 2015 we will experience a "blockbuster, once in a lifetime" special exhibit at the Detroit Institute of Arts. The exhibit features Diego Rivera and Frida Kahlo works created during the highly productive year of April 1931 through March 1932 they spent in Detroit.



This is a must see opportunity for everyone interested in the major contributions of the Detroit art community to the development of the arts. You may have seen the Diego Rivera mural "Detroit Industry" on the four walls of the DIA gathering space. During the same period Frida Kahlo developed her now renowned artistic identity.

Tickets are just \$20 per person, which includes motor coach transportation, exhibit fee, an instructional lecture prior to the exhibit and an audio guide for each attendee. Cafeteria style lunch is on your own in the DIA Café.

Joe Knollenberg

In 2004 Joe was re-elected with 58 percent of the vote. In 2006 he faced a tough campaign, ultimately winning by six percentage points. Two years later, in a difficult election cycle for Republican candidates, Joe lost his re-election bid to Gary Peters.

While in Congress, Joe was a member of the Appropriations Committee. He served on two subcommittees, one in charge of State, Foreign Operations, and Related Programs, and the other in charge of Transportation, Housing, and Urban Development and related agencies.

Returning to private life, Joe served on the Board of Directors of Nuclear Energy Institute (NEI). He was very familiar with the Senior Men's Club, having been an annual speaker during his time in Congress.

When asked about the Senior Men's Club, Joe said "I have a high regard for the Club. I like the people. Through their speakers and other activities, they play an important role in the community."

The feeling is mutual according to John Flintosh, a member since 2003. "Joe Knollenberg is a popular, well known, and highly respected member of the community," he said. "He is well connected in Oakland County, Lansing and Washington."

Joe and his wife Sandie are residents of Bloomfield Hills. They have two sons.


