Here is a condensed list: Hospital supplies such as bed pans, wash basins, etc. (stainless steel only), bandages, syringes, new rubber goods, wheel chairs, walkers, braces, etc. Microscopes, gold (dental or jewelry), baby food, cabinets, dental items, eyeglasses (no loose lenses), office files, typewriters and copy machines, bars of soap (hotel), hanks of yarn, drugs (current date only), lab equipment and supplies. This is a rough idea of major items.
