Life Member induction recognizes any active member who has reached eighty-five years of age and has been a member of the Club for ten consecutive years. Here we see Bob Siewert with his gold-colored name badge in recognition of this achievement.

Bob Siewert was born in Winnetka, IL on February 16, 1940. He attended New Trier High School and went to Cornell University where he received BME & MME degrees. After serving two years of active duty in the Army, including Vietnam in 1966 with an engineer construction battalion, he went on to serve 12 years of reserve duty and entered the retired reserves as a Major.

In 1968 Bob joined the GM Research Labs in Warren and retired in 2009 after 41 years as a Senior Staff Research Engineer. His work centered on research on automobile engines. He earned numerous patents and awards and was named a Fellow in the Society of Automotive Engineers.

An active dad of three, Bob was a Scoutmaster, North Trails District Commissioner, and soccer coach. After the children were raised Bob served for 30 years as a youth and adult soccer referee and particularly enjoyed refereeing the Special Olympics.

Along with his wife Coco and children, Bob traveled extensively across forty-nine states and five continents. An active church goer and community volunteer Bob and Coco moved to Tampa, Florida in 2023 to live closer to their daughter and two of their eight grandchildren.

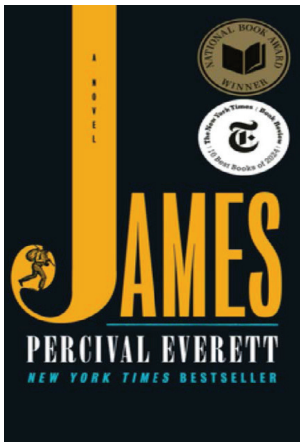

MONDAY AND WEDNESDAY READING GROUPS

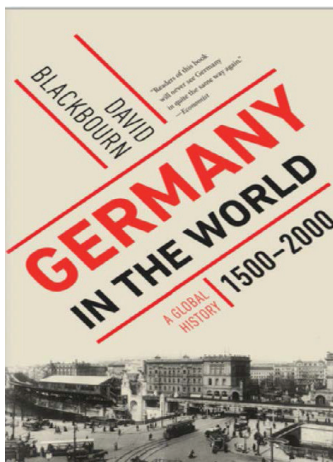


In April we will discuss two very different books. The first is *James*, a contemporary re-imagining of Mark Twain's *Huckleberry Finn*. This book has received numerous best book awards and has been on the NYTimes best seller list for most of the last year. The second is a well-reviewed discussion of Germany's impact on world history for the last five or six centuries.

The two groups will continue to meet via Zoom. As always, all members and their guests are welcome. Please let Bob Maxfield or Roger Timm know if you would like to be added to our distribution list.

Wednesday, April 2 at 10:30 AM: *James* by Percival Everett (New York: Doubleday, 2024). Bob Maxfield will lead this discussion.

From the publisher: "When the enslaved Jim overhears that he is about to be sold to man in New Orleans, separated from his wife and daughter forever, he decides to hide on nearby Jackson Island until he can formulate a plan. Meanwhile, Huck Finn has faked his own death to escape his violent father, recently returned to town. As all readers of American literature know, thus begins the dangerous and transcendent journey by raft down the Mississippi River toward the elusive and too-often-unreliable promise of the Free States and beyond. While many narrative set pieces of *Adventures of Huckleberry Finn* remain in place (floods and storms, stumbling across both unexpected death and unexpected treasure in the myriad stopping points along the river's banks, encountering the scam artists posing as the Duke and Dauphin...), Jim's agency, intelligence and compassion are shown in a radically new light. The Chicago Tribune reviewer called it "A masterpiece that will help redefine one of the classics of American literature, while also being a major achievement on its own."



Monday, April 21 at 3 PM: *Germany in the World: A Global History: 1500-2000* by David Blackbourn. (New York: Liveright Publishers, 2023) This discussion will be led by Don Haffner.

Award-winning historian David Blackbourn radically revises conventional narratives of German history, demonstrating the existence of a distinctly German presence in the world centuries before its unification-and revealing a national identity far more complicated than previously imagined. Blackbourn traces Germany's evolution from the loosely bound Holy Roman Empire of 1500 to a sprawling colonial power to a twenty-first-century beacon of democracy.

From the review in The Guardian: "A rich and full-throated account of the past 500 years . . . From the intellectual giants who enriched the west to the descent into dictatorship and war, the story of Germany's global impact – up to its modern rebirth – is told with real verve."

CLASSIC MOVIE GROUP



On Monday, April 14th at 1:00 PM, Swarn Rajpal will present, via Zoom, the Hindi cinema classic drama film “Two Eyes, Twelve Hands” (1957) (2 hours / 40 minutes). Directed by the legendary V Shantaram, the story is about a young prison warden, Andinath (played by Shantaram), who believes that he can rehabilitate six dangerous prisoners by setting them free and allowing them to work together, with him, for their common good and ultimately to become persons of virtue. The film follows the men through the many difficult and unusual circumstances they face during their rehabilitation process, right up to the final scene.

The film was inspired by the story of an actual “open prison” experiment, held some years earlier in India, that Shantaram believed needed to be told. In doing so, he created a masterpiece and one of his best films. The movie was both a critical and commercial success and remains popular to this day with a Rotten Tomatoes score of 92% and an IMDb of 8.4/10. In 2005, Indiatimes Movies ranked the movie as one of the Top 25 Must See Bollywood Films.

An excellent review and analysis of this outstanding movie is now available to watch by pressing the CMG Movie Preview Button on the Club’s Homepage.

So, mark your calendars now and plan to join Swarn, and the rest of the Classic Movie Group, on April 14, to watch, enjoy and discuss this classic Bollywood presentation.
