I am very pleased to recognize Bob Hayes as our latest life member. Bob was born on October 2, 1934, in Staten Island, New York. He lived on Staten Island until volunteering for the US Air Force at age 18. While in the Air Force, Bob was part of an air crew that was involved in Operation Redwing. Operation Redwing exploded a massive H bomb in the Pacific. The worldwide reaction to the test

resulted in the end of atmospheric testing of thermonuclear weapons.

Bob spent most of his more than 35 year career at General Motors in its Overseas Operations Division as an overseas representative and trainer. This included assignments in Southeast Asia, Japan, Argentina, the Caribbean, and the Middle East. He also served as a Supervisor of Vehicle Warranty and in program development at the GM Tech Center in Warren.

Bob has been a Free and Accepted Mason for 64 years. He served in multiple leadership roles in the Boy Scouts for over 25 years.

Bob has been there whenever and wherever help is needed at the Club. He has subbed as Club Recording Secretary in five different administrations, served for eight years on the Visitation and Health Committee, belonged to the Membership Committee, and served as an officer-at-large. He has participated as an attendance taker and as a greeter. He handled guest registrations, offered invocations and moments of interest. The list goes on in about all the ways Bob has stepped forward to assist over the years.

Bob is married to Joan. Together, they have six children, 12 grandchildren, and 9 great-grandchildren.

On Monday, May 15th Dave Strubler, Ralph Bergemann, Ray Buratto, John Maten and Paul Kovceses volunteered as part of the Habitat Oakland County Rock the Block kickoff event to help in the neighborhood revitalization program in Pontiac.

The volunteers were assigned to remove an old existing deck and build a new one for a homeowner on Ferry Street. The men worked with 2 "full time" volunteer/experts to accomplish the task. It was determined that the step system of the old deck was in good shape and could be used on another home, so it had to be carefully removed and NOT thoroughly


trashed as you see on most DIY programs. While the removal was being done, others began to layout the new deck system. To ensure the new deck framing structure was square, measurements were taken and



it was determined that it was out of square by 3/8". In order to ensure that the diagonal end didn't move when the opposite end was struck with a sledge hammer, we were all assigned the task of standing together at the end and smiling for a picture!

We left at the end of the day with the framing structure, 4x4 posts and a good portion of the deck boards installed. Another crew will take it from there and finish it the following day. The experience was very rewarding, old friends were reacquainted, new friends were made and an appreciation for the commitment these "full time" volunteers make to be part of the re-birth of Pontiac is admirable.

SMCB JUNE 14 RIVER CRUISE


June 14 Cruise - tickets await you on June 2 & 9.

MONDAY AND WEDNESDAY READING GROUPS

The readings for June should lead to two excellent discussions. The first is a book dealing with the respective roles of Franklin Roosevelt and Winston Churchill in the climactic final years of World War II. The second session will focus on two studies published by the Brookings institution on the evolving, sometimes troubling, relationship between the US and China. The China discussion might be of interest to members who do not usually participate in the reading groups.

By the time you receive this issue of The Reminder you will have received schedule for the upcoming round of books to be discussed by the first Wednesday group.

Wednesday, June 7, 10:30 AM: *War and Peace: FDR's Final Odyssey D-Day to Yalta, 1943-1945* by Nigel Hamilton (New York: Houghton Mifflin, 2019)

This book is the third part of Hamilton's remarkable trilogy about FDR's role as wartime president. One historian referred to it as the memoir that Roosevelt never got to write because of his untimely death in 1945. It was published in 2019 to commemorate the 75th anniversary of D-Day.

From Peter Baker's review in the NY Times: "Roosevelt was the architect and engineer who translated Churchill's grandiloquence into a plan for victory. The Allies did fight on the beaches, as Churchill once memorably vowed, but it fell to Franklin Roosevelt to make sure they were the right beaches." Roger Timm will lead this discussion

While working on his latest film, George meets and falls in love with a very charismatic young aspiring actress, Peppy Miller (Berenice Bejo), who also feels the same way about him. But George is reluctant to cheat on his wife (Penelope Ann Miller) and is also caught up in the industry change from silent to sound motion pictures, which he does not think highly of. He makes his own silent film, but it does poorly at the box office, while his young friend's star shines ever brighter over Hollywood with her very successful talking pictures. As in all great romantic stories, all works out well at the end and, in this case, getting there results in some outstanding film making. The main characters are supported by an outstanding cast including: James Cromwell,



John Goodman, Malcolm McDowell and Uggie (George's trusty canine companion, who steals more than one scene in the movie). The outstanding musical score and top-notch cinematography further compliment this outstanding film.

The Artist was a huge commercial and artistic success, being nominated for ten Oscars and winning five, including Best Picture and Best Actor for Dujardin. The film enjoys a Rotten Tomatoes rating of 95%. Although it is a silent film, it is acclaimed for the creative use of "old" technology to dazzling effect to illustrate the insistent conquest of a new technology against an established one.


