SMCB FOUNDATION AWARDS 3RD GRANT



The Senior Men's Club Foundation awarded its third grant of the year to the Alzheimer's Association - Michigan Chapter at the Friday, March 10th meeting of the Senior Men's Club of Birmingham. The \$10,000 grant will be used to support their Dementia Care Training Programs.

Accepting the grant from Foundation President Tim McGee and Foundation Director Larry Imerman was Jean Barnas, Program Director.

Mr. McGee stated: "Studies provide stark statistics about a reality that 6 million Americans with dementia and their families live every day: one where people with dementia receive hundreds of hours a month in unpaid care from spouses, adult children and other relatives, and where some rely on paid help including nursing home care.

"We have all known men who have acted as caregivers for their wives who have suffered from dementia. Many lack family in the area or others who might provide relief from their 24/7 responsibilities. Our grant is intended to help those men by allowing them to bring in a home health aide or bring their loved one to a licensed day care program."

The Senior Men's Club Foundation is a recognized 501c3 Non-Profit Organization dedicated to the support of initiatives enhancing the well-being of senior men within the Greater Detroit Metropolitan area of the State of Michigan. The Foundation is organized and operated exclusively for charitable and educational purposes serving senior men and their spouses.



SMCB MONTHLY CALENDAR – FAQ

Have you ever woken up late at night wondering about the SMCB monthly calendar? Probably not, but in case you have, here are a few frequently asked questions that have been received regarding the calendar and how it works.

Q.What is the monthly SMCB calendar? And where can I find a copy of it?

A, The calendar is an at-a-glance tool published at the end of the current month, showing Club activities scheduled for the next month. The calendar is published in The Reminder newsletter each month, and can also be found on our website by navigating to the main web page - https://www. seniormensclubbirmingham.com/ and moving the cursor to just below the speaker bio portion of the main web-page. The calendar is easily viewed using either a computer or mobile browser.

Q.What does the calendar coordinator do?

A. The coordinator publishes a calendar of committee meetings, activity group events, and special club events for the upcoming month. They also reserve and coordinate meeting rooms for your group at Baldwin Library if needed; the coordinator also helps determine which room would work best, and if any audio visual or network access or camera support is needed.

Q.When is the calendar assembled for the next month?

A. The calendar is created about three weeks prior to the first day of the next month. Most items in the calendar re-occur each month on a regular basis. Changes may occur after publication, so always check the website or the committee chair for details on changes.

Q. My group only meets once or twice a year, should I publish the meeting in the calendar and when should I contact you for publishing?

A. Please contact the calendar coordinator early in the month before your meeting to arrange for publication and room reservation (if needed) at the library. Many groups maintain an active distribution list to alert committee/group members of the meeting on their own, however, publication in the calendar may encourage participation by members not on the distribution list.

Q. How do I reach the calendar coordinator to publish an item or ask a question?

In April we will be discussing two very different books. The first is a true account of submarine warfare in the Pacific during World War II, and the second is comedian Albert Brooks' first novel which raises importance questions about the kind of future we want.

Wednesday, April 5: Thunder Below: The US "Barb" Revolutionizes Submarine Warfare in World War II by Eugene Fluckey, Jr. (Champaign: University of Illinois Press, 1997)

From the publisher: "Among the scores of US submarine skippers in WW II's Pacific theater, Fluckey, captain of

the Barb on five war patrols, was credited with sinking the greatest tonnage of enemy shipping. All told, he and his well-trained crew sent over 85 Japanese vessels (including a carrier, a cruiser, and a frigate) to the bottom. They also laid waste to a host of coastal installations, destroying Japan's largest paper mill as well as a sizable shipyard and, on one occasion, slipping ashore to blow up a 16-car military train (thereby becoming the only Americans to land on Japanese soil before the guns fell silent). A 1935 graduate of Annapolis, Fluckey offers a grippingly detailed account of his command's hell-and-high-water feats, which won him the Congressional Medal of Honor, as well as four Navy Crosses. While willing, even eager, to go in harm's way—e.g., by searching for prey on the surface rather than submerged—Fluckey was not reckless. On his watch, no man aboard the Barb earned a Purple Heart (awarded for having been wounded)—a stunning accomplishment at a time when half of the silent service's craft failed to make round trips."

While it is humorous, it raises important questions

On Monday, April 10, at 1:00PM, the Classic Movie Group will travel back in time to present a traditional mid-1930's Monday Matinee, via Zoom, featuring one of the all-time best movie comedy teams: Stan Laurel and Oliver Hardy.

The main feature will be "Way Out West" (1937) (1 hour/6 minutes). In this comedy/western, an old prospector friend of Stan & Ollie asks them to deliver the deed to his gold mine to his daughter, Mary (Rosina Lawrence), who lives in Brushwood Gulch. After arriving in town, Mary's ruthless guardians (James Finlayson and Sharon Lynne) fool the boys into handling over the deed to them, by pretending that Sharon is Mary. Upon meeting the real Mary, the pair realize their mistake and set out to make things right.

This film is regarded as one of the best of the Laurel & Hardy features (scoring 100% approval on the Rotten Tomatoes Tomatometer) and was the second picture for which Stan Laurel was the Producer. Among the excellent musical moments in the movie are two songs, "The Trail of the Lonesome Pine" and "At the Ball, That's All". All in all, the film is a great mix of Laurel & Hardy comedy with 1930's B-Western action. A fun show in all respects.

As an added attraction we will screen the famous Laurel & Hardy two reel comedy "Hog Wild" (1930) (20 minutes). In this iconic film, Stan offers to help Ollie install a radio antenna on the roof of his home, so that Mrs. Hardy can listen to short wave broadcasts from overseas. Needless to say, things don't go well for the boys, but we get to enjoy some of the best classic comedy and special effects of the day.
